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I am a digital and cultural anthropologist focussing on the religious, ethical, and societal response to artificial intelligence (AI). I employ traditional and digital ethnographical techniques to study digital religions, transhumanists, and public discourse. Fieldwork has taken place in the UK, the USA, Japan, and among online communities and on social media. My science communication work includes a series of award-winning short documentaries on AI, popular publications, science festival talks, press interviews, and international media appearances. My research has also been recognised in awards, including the 2021 Digital Religion Research Award from the Network for New Media, Religion, and Digital Culture Studies, the 2017 Arts and Humanities Research Council's Best Research Film of the Year, the Evening Standard's *Progress 1000*, the Hay Festival's *30 to Watch* and Cofinitive's *21 to Watch*.
